OUR INTERVENTIONS (2021-2022)

1. Support to PwDs

SIVA Trust identified some deserving persons with disability for the charity-related work of STdHF, in the Mettupalayam area of Coimbatore District.

The programme was graced by Dr Aravinth Karthikeyan, President of Rotary Mettupalayam Prime as the chief guest. Assistive devices were distributed to the following persons with disability on that occasion:

- Kanagavalli (38yrs): Karamadai hails from a poor family. She is crippled from her birth and could not go to any school. She has learnt plastic wire bag weaving and making a foot mat. She was given a wheelchair to enable her easy mobility.
- Valliammal (36 yrs): Her parents work as daily wage labourers. She had completed her studies up to the 9th standard, but unfortunately, she fell ill and became immobilized during that time. Now, she relies on her sister and her sister's husband for her daily needs. To assist her mobility, she was provided with a wheelchair.
- .Prabhavathi (50yrs): Having been affected by a polio attack, she became crippled at a young age and lives off of the earnings of her mother, who is also a daily wager. She earns a small income by making flower garlands. She was given a wheelchair for her mobility and also for her efforts to earn a living.
- Ziyavudeen (37 yrs): Since a young age, he has been affected by polio. Despite this, he managed to complete his
 education up to the 10th standard and is now married. He operates a small-scale vegetable business right
 outside his house. To assist him in his mobility, he relies on a walking stick, and a pair of walking sticks was
 provided to him.

• Nagaraj (36yrs): Nagaraj has been suffering from nerve problems in his legs, which eventually led to the amputation of one leg. Consequently, he has been unable to walk for the past 15 years. Despite having completed his education only up to the 3rd standard, he worked as a daily wage labourer. To aid his mobility, he required a hand-operated tricycle. Unfortunately, on the day the tricycle was scheduled to be distributed, Nagaraj was admitted to the hospital due to a heart stroke. As a result, the tricycle was given to his sister. Tragically, Nagaraj passed away the following day without having the chance to use the tricycle. Therefore, it has been decided that the tricycle will be retrieved from his sister and given to another deserving individual in the same area.





2. Other Support

- In the Vagamon area of the Idukki district, 20
 economically backward communities reliant on
 tea plucking were provided with dry ration kits.
 STdHF contributed Rs. 143,280 towards this
 initiative. The facilitation partner, FCC in
 Vagamon, and the beneficiaries expressed their
 gratitude to the company for its timely support.
- In Veerapandianpattinam near Tiruchendur, there is a residential school for children with intellectual challenges. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, they faced difficulty in finding sponsors to provide nutritious food to the 35 inmates at the Karunalaya home. Responding to a request from Secretary Mrs Radhika Thanis, STdHF offered support of Rs. 33,285 to purchase groceries for a month to cater to these children's needs.
- An economically backward sand artist from Mecheri, Tamil Nadu, requested financial support from the company. He sought Rs. 20,000 to undergo a residential course for skill upliftment in Mysore and to support his family during his absence. STdHF granted his request to assist him in his training and provide support for two months.





- Ms Krishnapriya*, an early married girl facing financial challenges, approached STdHF through their partner, PMSR, Kollegal, seeking financial support to pursue her pre-university education. After careful review, the Board of Directors approved an educational scholarship of Rs. 20,000 for Ms Keerthana in September 2021.
- Following severe floods in Chennai in November 2021, the relocation colony of Semmancherry was severely affected. Mr Devansh* reached out to STdHF, requesting assistance in the form of milk and bread packets for 500 families in the Semmancherry Community, with a particular focus on children. The company incurred an expense of Rs. 40,000 to provide relief in the form of food items.
- An amount of Rs. 8,800 was allocated to support a woman with a disability in the Mettupalayam area of Tamil Nadu. The support aimed to help her meet her livelihood requirements while taking care of her two dependent children, thereby facilitating her mainstreaming in society.

Mrs Vimala is a 52-year-old woman who resides in Vinoba Nagar village, Uthiramerur block, Kanchipuram District along with her husband Nagaraj and her younger daughter. The family belongs to a scheduled tribe. Vimala and her husband borrowed money from their landowner 10 years ago for their daughters' wedding due to which they had to work as bonded labourers, cutting logs as a repayment. Apart from food, they were not given any facility or wage due to which they felt trapped and helpless.

When STdH staff got to know about their situation, they attempted to reason with the landlord about it. Unwilling to change his decision, the staff further went to the panchayat to lodge a complaint against him for exploiting Vimala. The authorities took immediate action and relieved Vimala and her husband from bonded labour.

They also became part of the STdH's Self-Help Group- Roja Magalir, through which they got a loan of Rs. 20000/-which they invested in setting up a small business selling tender coconuts in the streets. They now sell about 50 coconuts per day and make a profit of Rs 13,500 per month. Through this income, they are not only able to meet their basic needs but they also managed to get their younger daughter married.

They further got another loan for an amount of Rs. 30000 from the SHG and purchased a motorcycle which Nagaraj uses to sell tender coconuts in different localities. "Through STdH, I was able to set up the coconut business and now my hut house is also getting transformed into a concrete building through the profits we earned. Now my family is very happy."





Mrs Manimala, a 37-year-old from the Sri Vinayaga Self-Help Group (SHG) in Pallipalayam village, embarked on an entrepreneurial journey with the support of the Revolving Fund (RF) provided by the STdH. Her venture, a vegetable mandi in Pallipalayam, has proven to be a game-changer in overcoming the financial adversities the Covid-19 pandemic brought into her life.

With financial assistance, Mrs Manimala successfully procures fresh vegetables directly from growers and wholesale markets. Her daily sales currently range from INR 1000 to Rs 1500, with an increasing customer base.

The income generated from her business has played a vital role in supporting Mrs Manimala's family during the critical period of the Covid crisis. Her relentless efforts, combined with the unwavering support of her fellow women in the SHG, have given her the courage to envision a brighter future for her Vegetable Mandi business.

Mrs Manimala expresses her deep gratitude to STdH-RF for their programmatic and financial support. The organization's belief in her potential and its empowering resources have not only transformed her life but also inspired others in her community. Mrs Manimala's journey exemplifies the transformative power of entrepreneurship, bringing hope and prosperity even in the face of challenging circumstances
